

## ESG First Fund General Exclusion List

The activities of the targeted company are validated against the **Fund's Exclusion List and KFW Exclusion List**<sup>1</sup>. ESG First Fund will not invest in the following businesses or activities:

- Production of, or trade in, any product or activity deemed illegal under applicable local or national laws or regulations or subject to internationally agreed phase-outs or bans as defined in global conventions and agreements such as certain:
  - o hazardous chemicals, PCB's (Polychlorinated Biphenyl's) and other specific, hazardous pharmaceuticals, pesticides/herbicides, and wastes;<sup>2</sup>
  - ozone depleting substances;<sup>3</sup>
  - o endangered or protected wildlife or wildlife products;<sup>4</sup> and
  - unsustainable fishing methods such as blast fishing and drift net fishing in the marine environment using nets in excess of 2.5 kilometres in length;
- Production of, or trade in, arms (i.e. weapons, munitions or nuclear products, primarily designated for military purposes);
- Destruction of High Conservation Value areas<sup>5</sup>;
- Production of, use of, or trade in, unbonded asbestos fibres
- Production of, or trade in, radioactive materials;
- Production or activities involving harmful or exploitative forms of forced labour/harmful child labour<sup>6</sup>;
- Pornography and/or Prostitution;
- Racist and/or anti-democratic media;
- Any businesses, if any of the following activities represents a substantial portion of such business:<sup>7</sup>
  - o Production or trade in alcoholic beverages (excluding beer and wine)
  - o Production or trade in tobacco
  - Gambling, casinos and equivalent enterprises
